November is the month when we pause and take a moment to acknowledge those things in our lives that we are grateful for. In this month's newsletter, our


staff will share their own reasons to be thankful. Of course, all of our patrons are very high on the list!





In times more uncertain than ever before, Dear William answers the call for increased attention to individual and family substance use and mental health. His is a message that students and parents throughout the world need to hear.

As a creator of the national William Magee
Institute for Student Wellbeing at the University of Mississippi, David
Magee is on a mission to find and share solutions to one of America's
biggest problems that touches too many high school and college
students-self-medication and substance use disorder.

The Boys: A Memoir of Hollywood and Family by Ron Howard.

Happy Days, The Andy Griffith Show, Gentle Ben--these shows captivated millions of TV viewers in the '60s and '70s. Join award-winning filmmaker Ron Howard and audience-favorite actor Clint Howard as they frankly and fondly share their unusual family story of navigating and surviving life as sibling child actors.

"What was it like to grow up on TV?" Ron Howard has been asked this question throughout his adult life. in The Boys, he and his younger brother, Clint,

examine their childhoods in detail for the first time. For Ron, playing Opie on The Andy Griffith Show and Richie Cunningham on Happy Days offered fame, joy, and opportunity—but also invited stress and bullying. For Clint, a fast start on such programs as Gentle Ben and Star Trek petered out in adolescence, with some tough consequences and lessons.

By turns confessional, nostalgic, heartwarming, and harrowing, THE BOYS is a dual narrative that lifts the lid on the Howard brothers' closely-held lives. It's the journey of a tight four-person family unit that held fast in an unforgiving business and of two brothers who survived "child-actor syndrome" to become fulfilled adults.

<u>Peril</u> by Bob Woodward and Robert Costa.

The transition from President Donald J. Trump to President Joseph R. Biden Jr. stands as one of the most dangerous periods in American history. Woodward and Costa take readers deep inside the Trump White House, the Biden White House, the 2020 campaign, and the Pentagon and Congress, with vivid, eyewitness accounts of what really happened.

They also provide a look at Biden's presidency as he faces the challenges of a lifetime: the continuing deadly pandemic and millions of Americans facing soul-crushing economic pain, all the while navigating a bitter and disabling partisan divide, a world rife with threats, and the hovering, dark shadow of the former president. -- adapted from jacket.

I'm sad to say goodbye to the families I've worked with, my coworkers, and my boss.


However, I am excited to move on and continue my education.


I'll never forget my time working for the Belen Public Library.



The problem with being related to everyone in town is that there is no one left to date; until now. But will this outsider survive his family? Former soldier Veronica "Ronnie" Morales isn't going to let her kid brother, Tiago, get pulled into the gangs of Minneapolis, so, seeking safety and a fresh start, she heads to sleepy Deep Haven on the north shore of Minnesota. She's hoping to put down roots as the paramedic for the new Crisis Response Team, but it's not easy to be the town outsider.

Fire Chief Peter Dahlquist is a peacemaker-he has to be. After all, he's related to both of the Deep Haven dynasties-the Zimmermans and the Dahlquists, Deep Haven's version of the Hatfields and the McCoys. Worse, Peter is the holdout vote for a landmark project, which also makes him the loneliest guy in town when both families demand that he pick sides. The only one who seems to understand his plight is the newcomer in town, his pretty, street-tough paramedic.

When Tiago finds himself caught up in small-town shenanigans and the town blames Ronnie for tragedy, Peter is forced to pick sides. But will his choice cost him the home and the woman he loves?

False Witness by Karin Slaughter.

Leigh Collier has worked hard to build what looks like a normal life. She's an up-and-coming defense attorney at a prestigious law firm in Atlanta, would do anything for her sixteen-year-old daughter Maddy, and is managing to successfully co-parent through a pandemic after an amicable separation from her husband Walter.

But Leigh's ordinary life masks a childhood no one should have to endure ... a childhood tarnished by secrets, broken by betrayal, and ultimately destroyed by a brutal act of violence.

The Municipal election that we just had brought to the forefront the fact that our community has a high unemployment rate; however, many of the available jobs require skills that our job force just doesn't yet have. Our plan is to implement training, workshops, our Makerspace, and outside resources to provide those skills to our job force while also supporting our local and small businesses.

We have been working on building an array of online and in-person resources for this and are excited about the possibilities.

By allowing the business community access to our many resources including

video recording, digital editing software, financial literacy and budgeting tools, social media and online marketing training, and more we are strengthening the backbone of Belen.

When we bring business owners together with people who are working hard to improve their skills, important connections are made. We believe that we can help job seekers find the career that is the right fit for them by assisting in forging these connections by providing the environment for them to take place.

Currently, we offer the following services/programs:

- Computer Classes
- College Level Courses through Gale
- Career Online High School
- Language Classes <u>through Gale</u> or <u>Transparent Language</u>
- Job Preparation/Resume Writing assistance
- Video recording tools including lighting and a green screen
- Video editing software
- Digital editing software

We are actively working on implementing:

- Makerspace with a variety of STEAM tools for both small/local businesses as well as job seekers to make use of.
- Small business resource fair
- Additional online resources for job training
- Financial Literacy training/resources
- Budgeting software training
- Regular networking opportunities



Harvey House Museum Events


